### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

#### **LEGAL STATUS**

The Society obtained charitable status on 7th April 2000 and is registered as Charity No.1080250. It is a company limited by guarantee and without a share capital. The company changed its name to The British- Spanish Society on 24th June 2013.

#### **OBJECTS**

The principal objects of the Society are for the benefit of the people of The United Kingdom to advance their education about Spain, its people and cultures, its history and literature, the language, their institutions and folklore, and its economy, in order to promote understanding, knowledge and harmonious relations, and to educate similarly the people of Spain about The United Kingdom.

### **ACCOUNTS:**

The accounts for the year ended 31 December 2022 are set out in the attached financial statements. Funds of £51,000 (2021: £42,000) have been raised from the Principal Supporters for the Grants Fund from which Scholarships amounting to £51,000 (2021: £42,000) have been awarded during the year.

During the year, the charity also expended £9,813 (2020: £9,509) on the production of journals.

#### **EVENTS REVIEW FOR THE YEAR**

#### **Summary of Activities**

We started 2022 on a positive note and tried to put the difficulties of holding events during Covid behind us. We learnt in 2021 that hybrid could be a positive option and tried to continue to incorporate online events within our 2022 calendar.

- Autumn reception at the Ambassador's residence in Madrid
- Visit to Kew Gardens with Carlos Magdalena
- Summer reception at the Ambassador's residence in London
- Wine tasting with Harold Heckle and Norrel Robertson in Madrid
- Wine tasting with Sarah Jane Evans at Hispania in London
- Spring bring and share lunch in the gardens of St Mary's Cadogan Street Church, London
- (postponed) Christmas dinner with guest Tom Burns in Madrid
- A guided visit to the Wallace collection
- A flamenco master class and tapas at Battersea Spanish

We were all delighted to be able to return to in person events and enjoy time together. Income raised from events, members' contributions and corporate supporters allowed the BSS to continue to promote exchanges between the two countries and also support our charitable mission of awarding scholarships.

The 2022 Scholarship ceremony took place at the Spanish Embassy in Belgrave Square, London, hosted by Spanish ambassador José Pascual Marco Martinez.

We were again amazed by the quality and diversity of the applications we received from talented Spanish and British researchers working to improve aspects of society in a range of fields. During the event, winning scholars talked about their projects, followed by a short recital by former scholar Laura Peribañez, a former scholarship winner.

Three editions of our glossy magazine La Revista featured a wide array of original articles on aspects of our mutual cultures. Cover features included interviews with Penelope Cruz, a celebration of the flamenco season at Sadlers Wells and heartfelt tributes to the late Queen. The magazine was again circulated in hard copy to our members and sponsors, and also made available in digital format on the website.

In 2022 we vastly expanded the content of our social media output on Facebook, Instagram, Linked-In and Twitter. The data shows that we are reaching an ever-wider community.

Our outreach to partners in the same field continued, with the signing of a cooperation agreement with the Instituto Cervantes in February and a revitalised agreement with Comillas in November. Our Chairman and Head of Scholarships were both speakers at SRUK conferences. Convivial interchange continued with the Fundacion Hispano Britannica, the Anglo-Argentine Society and the Anglo Peruvian Society. We appreciate the support of the British Council and the Spanish Tourist Office.

### **PUBLIC BENEFIT**

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# THE BRITISH-SPANISH SOCIETY (LIMITED BY GUARANTEE) STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

The charity's trustees (who are also the directors of The British Spanish Society for the purpose of company law) are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the trustees must prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees confirm that so far as they are aware, there is no relevant audit information (as defined by section 418(3) of the Companies Act 2006) of which the charitable company's auditors are unaware. They have taken all the steps that they ought to have taken as trustees in order to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the charitable company's auditors are aware of that information.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

### 1. Charity information

The company operates as a charitable company limited by guarantee incorporated in England & Wales (Charity number 1080250, Company number 03897282) and is a Public Benefit Entity operating from 7 New Quebec Street, Marylebone, London W1H 7RH.

### 2. Accounting Policies

### **Basis of accounting**

a) The financial statements have been prepared on the historical basis of accounting and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Companies Act 2006, the Charities SORP (FRS 102) and the accounting policies set out below.

The charity relies on donations and voluntary income to carry out its work. Due to the nature of fundraising there can be considerable variation in both the receipt and timing of such income. The trustees have reviewed the level of income received and receivable after the year end and are satisfied that such income will be sufficient to settle current commitments and to enable the charity to continue to carry out its planned program of activities. On this basis it is deemed appropriate to prepare the accounts on a going concern basis.

### b) Incoming resources

With the exception of donations, all income is accounted for on an accruals basis.

### c) Resources expended

Expenditure on charitable activities includes the direct costs of the activities and depreciation on related assets. Where support costs relate to more than one activity they have been apportioned as appropriate. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis.

### d) Restricted funds

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure that meets these criteria is applied to the fund together with a fair allocation of management and support costs where applicable.

### e) Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds comprise donations and other income received or generated for charitable purposes.

#### f) <u>Liabilities</u>

All liabilities are recognised in full in the period in which they are incurred.

In order to honour and further its principal aim of promoting friendship and understanding between the people of Britain and Spain through knowledge of each other's customs, institutions, history and way of life, the British-Spanish Society has had since 2008 the pleasure of awarding Scholarships and Bursaries to Spanish and British post-graduate students conducting research in fields as diverse as medicine, urban planning, engineering, linguistics, literature, physics, architecture, marine archaeology and music. These scholarships are funded by the annual contribution of The Society's principal supporters.

The Society's principal supporters have provided sponsorship amounting to £51,000 during the year, from which scholarships and bursaries amounting to £51,000 in total have been allocated and fully paid during the year.
